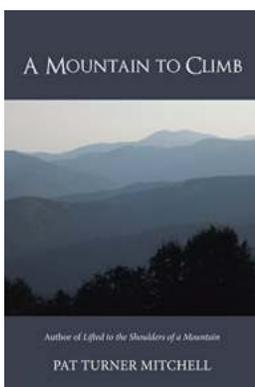

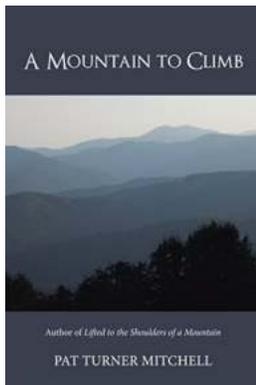

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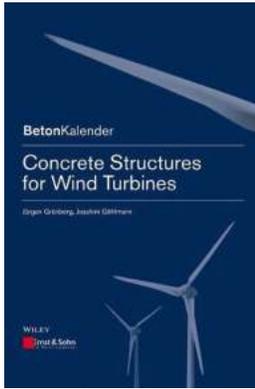
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Author Pat Turner Mitchell narrates the story of her parents and their history in A Mountain to Climb.

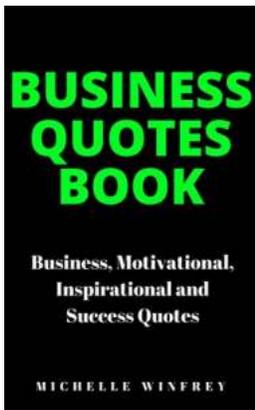
