definition of the soul, and his explanations of nutrition, perception, cognition, and animal self-motion.

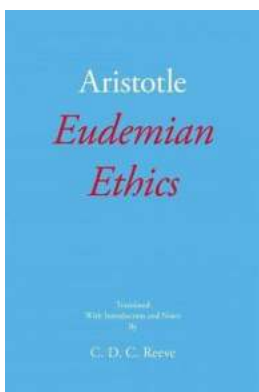
