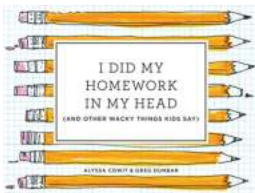

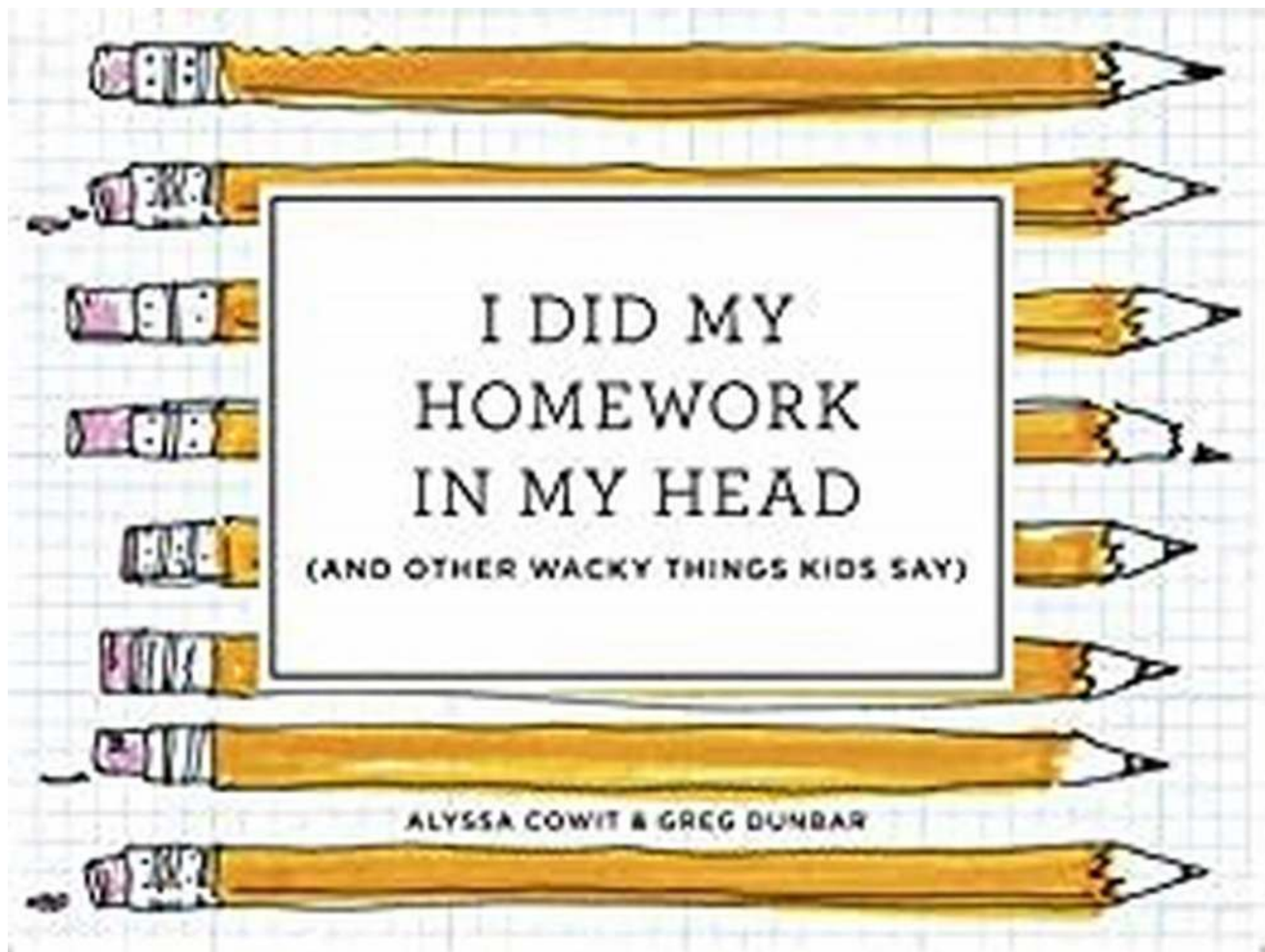

9. "What if bananas could fly? Would we have to duck every time one passes by?"

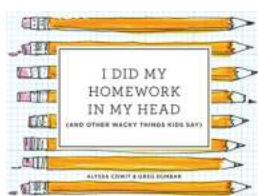
