

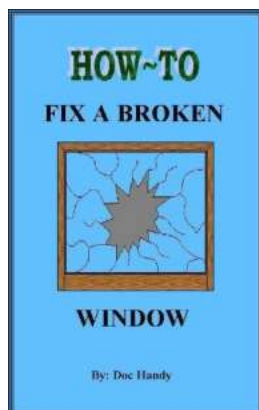
How To Fix Broken Window: Easy Home Repair Improvement Tips

Gather the Necessary Tools and Materials

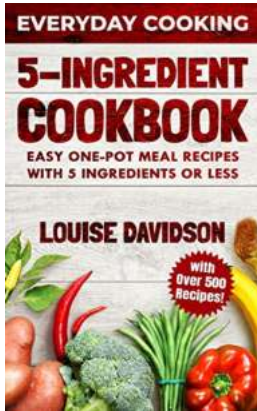
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
