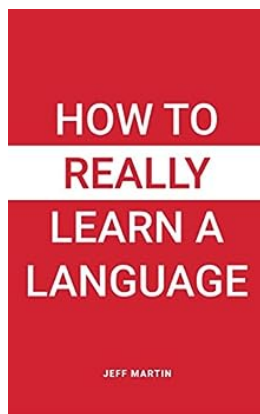

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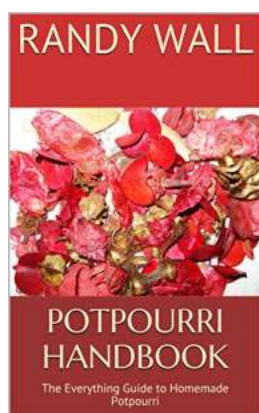
Where are all the bilinguals?

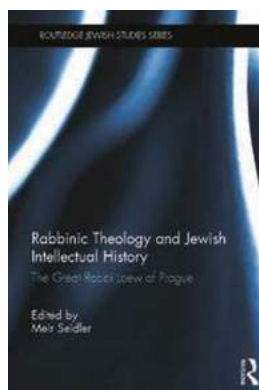
never truly learned a foreign language. My mission is to change that. I've spent the last eleven years writing a book just for you.
