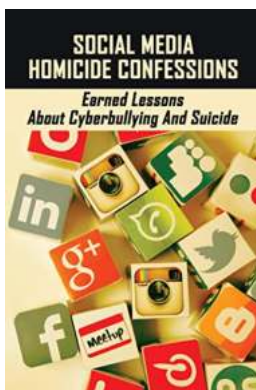
modernization or strived to reveal and reform problems linked to the region's racial caste system and exploitative agricultural economy.
