

My Decade In And Out Of Humanitarian Aid



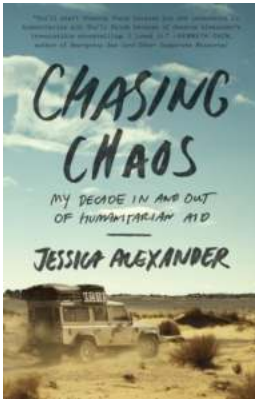

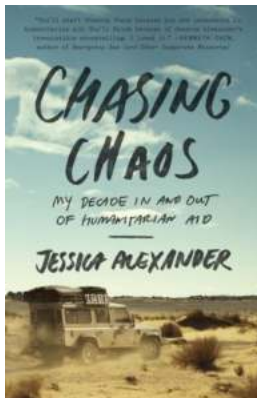
Tracing her personal journey from wide-eyed and naïve newcomer to hardened cynic and, ultimately, to hopeful but critical realist, Alexander transports readers to

some of the most troubled locations around the world and shows us not only the seemingly impossible challenges, but also the moments of resilience and recovery.



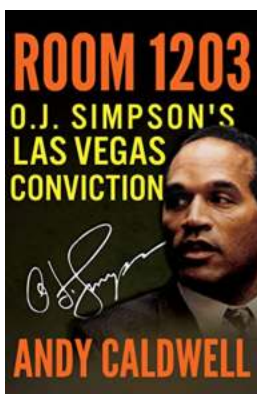
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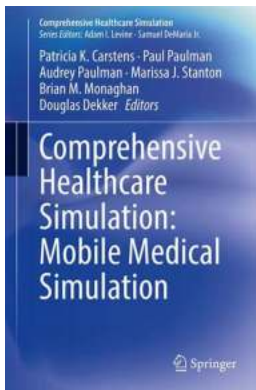
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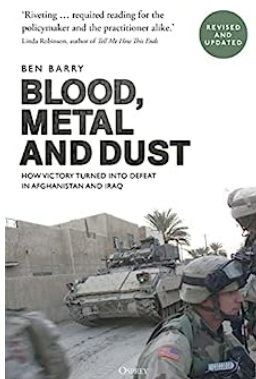
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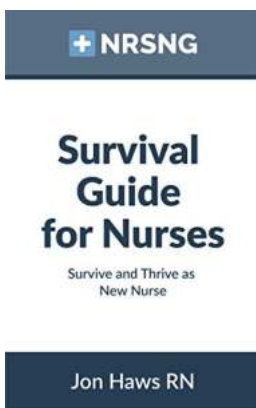
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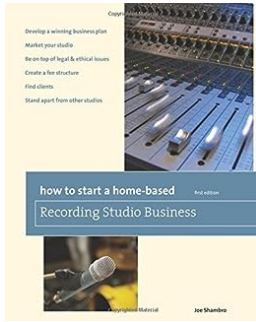
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
