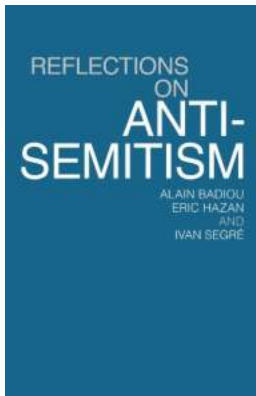

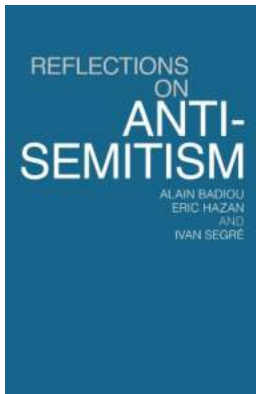

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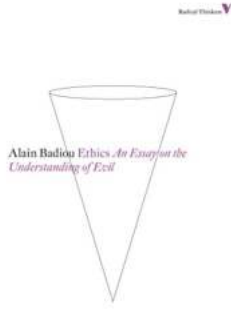


Dissecting how facile accusations of “anti-Semitism” are used to stifle dissent
