Stop Boredom, Motivate Students To Love School





Encourage open communication and active student participation. Provide constructive feedback and recognize their achievements to boost their self-confidence and engagement.


Allow Student Choice and Autonomy

Remember, engaged and enthusiastic students are more likely to thrive academically and build a lifelong passion for learning.



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
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


What motivates students? The survey showed that they enjoy classes with creative group projects as well as discussion and debate opportunities. Yazzie-Mintz feels that students want to be intellectually challenged and that projects, particularly in the areas of technology, art, and drama, are rated high. He also feels that boredom can be counteracted if lessons encourage interaction between teachers and peers. It boils down to this: Students want to be empowered as engaged agents in the classroom, validated as capable thinkers, and relevant amidst their peers. Yazzie-Mintz is telling us that this is not transpiring with twothirds of American students.




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
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
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
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
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
