## Take your time

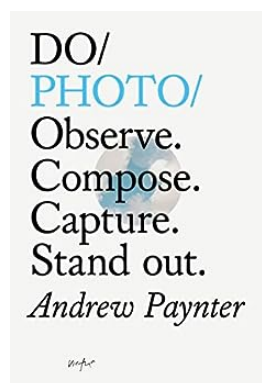
