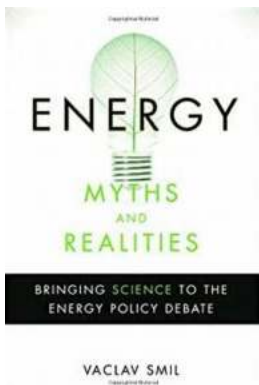
inventions that we most urgently need to confront the staggering challenges of the twenty-first century.
