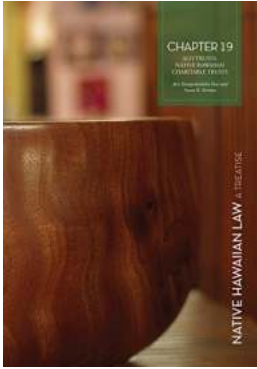

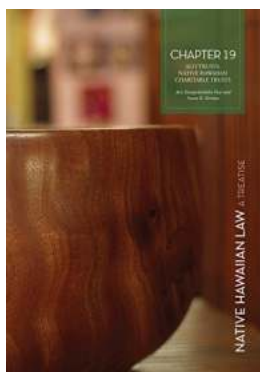

Each of these trusts was intended to address a specific social need: Kamehameha Schools/Bernice Pauahi Bishop Estate, education; the Queen Lili'uokalani Trust, care for orphans and indigent children; the King William Charles Lunalilo Trust, care for the impoverished elderly; and the Queen Emma Trust, medical care. In recent years, Native Hawaiians have been increasingly obliged to defend the trusts against legal challenges.

Kamehameha Schools, in particular, has been the object of several lawsuits, partly because Ke Ali'i Pauahi's legacy has become one of the wealthiest and
