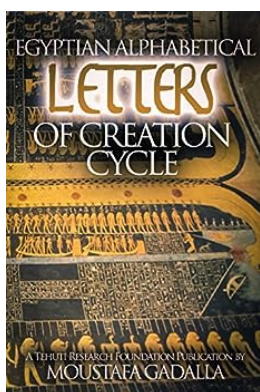

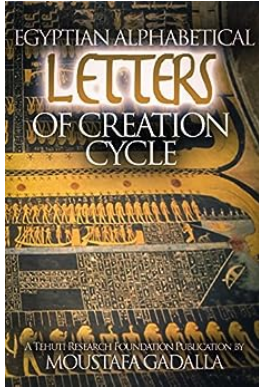

Part IV. The Reunification Phase/Ennead has ten chapters—25 through 34:

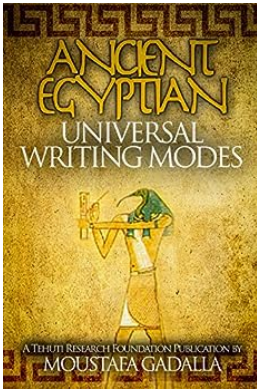

Part V being chapter 35 covers the 28th Mansion/Letter 'Gh'—representing The New Alpha.

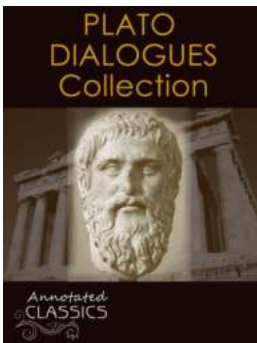
